Our first scheduled meeting for this year is to be held at our normal venue, the **Roseville Memorial RSL Club**, **Pacific Highway**, **Roseville**, on the evening of **Wednesday**, **February 5**, 2003 with the meeting's proceedings to commence at 7pm.

Members will be able to meet at the Club from 6pm for a bistro style meal – a welcome return to earlier times!

The presentation planned for this meeting is something really special with **Margaret Lee, President, ACWRTA** from Melbourne to speak to the topic:

"What Were the Women Doing When the Men Were Fighting?"

Margaret, a librarian by profession, has undertaken some quite innovative research of Civil War history where she has combined established library cataloguing techniques with leading edge computer technology. Her focus has been on largely untapped areas of the unfortunately named "Sanitary Commission" and the activities initiated by women (and subsequently taken over by some opportunistic men) that supported the Union's war-effort during the critical 1861 - 1865 period. Margaret will explain the various fund-raising "Sanitary Fairs" involving some 13 major fairs, 80+ medium sized fairs and thousands of small local fairs. These events involved some 10,000 women's groups and raised over \$14,000,000 for humanitarian aid for the North. Margaret's research has provided an ideal knowledge base which, when coupled with her passion for the subject, make for a great presentation.

You may be assured of a most interesting, informative and thought provoking presentation on a subject that members would have great difficulty in exploring through the normal Civil War references and sources.

It is proposed that a question and answer/comment session will follow Margaret's presentation and a copy of Margaret's paper will be included with the "mail-out" of next Newsletter to our "Country Members".
